

## Texture Photography


Texture photography is a style that focuses on capturing the surface details of objects to highlight their texture. By emphasizing patterns, contrasts, and the tactile quality of a subject (like rough wood, smooth glass, or soft fabric), texture photography adds depth and interest to the image. Lighting, especially side lighting, plays a key role in making textures stand out.



The crumpled patterns resemble hidden art, and the reduced brightness creates a calm atmosphere by softening the surface and highlighting shadows. ## Leading Lines


Leading lines in photography are elements, like roads or paths, that guide the viewer's eyes toward the main subject, adding depth and focus to the image.

### Rule of Thirds

The rule of thirds divides an image into nine parts, placing key elements along the grid lines or intersections to create a balanced and appealing composition.





A repeating pattern is a design where elements or shapes are repeated in consistent, predictable sequence, creating continuous and organized visual rhythm.










The green fern stands out against a blurred grass background, highlighting nature's quiet beauty and the story of growth and resilience. It is a good example of symmetry.

Long exposure photography involves using a slow shutter speed to capture motion over time. This technique allows moving elements like water, clouds, or lights to appear blurred or streaked, while stationary objects remain sharp, creating dramatic, artistic effects.


